

The State of Affordable Housing in Spokane County – January 2019

Housing needs of our local citizens

- 1,245 people were counted as homeless in our regional 2018 Point In Time count.
- 1387 Spokane Public Schools children and 890 Central, East and West Valley Schools children experienced homelessness in 2017-2018.
- There are only 30 affordable housing units available for every 100 people of Extremely Low Income \$24,350 for a household of 4.
- 53.1% of Spokane County renters are rent burdened paying more than 30% of their income on housing.
- We have about 8,000 quality, publicly-financed rentals in Spokane County. The Spokane
 Housing Authority circulates over 4,000 tenant-based vouchers. Given these resources,
 about 13,000 households are likely rent-burdened and/or live in substandard housing.
- The vacancy rate among affordable rental homes is under 2%.

Affordable housing funding environment

- The Federal investment in traditional housing production programs for seniors, persons with disabilities, and other populations has substantially dropped.
- The Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) program still receives Congressional support. Senator Maria Cantwell engineered a 12.5% increase in this program.
- The National Housing Trust Fund has been capitalized at \$267 million. About \$5.1 million has been allocated to Washington State.
- State investments in the Housing Trust Fund (HTF) have fallen from a 2007-2009 biennium high of \$200 million to a \$107 million investment for the 2017-2018 biennium. HTF applications totaled over \$234 million.

Actions that we, as a community, can take to expand access to affordable housing

- Advocate for an investment in the Housing Trust Fund to local and state electeds.
- Encourage local electeds to take advantage of state-enabled legislation to incentivize the provision of affordable housing, such as offering density bonuses, inclusionary housing, fee waivers or exemptions, parking reductions, and expedited permitting.

Accomplishments:

In 2018, SLIHC members provided a number of opportunities for people of low income. Here are a few of their successes:

- Transitions opened 24 cottages with the help of Community Frameworks.
- SNAP became a 25% owner of a senior housing program in Wilbur WA and is also re-entering the housing development realm.
- Spokane Housing Ventures completed the merger with NW Association for Housing Affordability and launched supportive services for vulnerable clients through the Jayne Auld Memorial fund.
- Catholic Charities opened 75 units for homeless singles and families at Sister's Haven and started construction on 100 more units at 2 locations.
- SLIHC member advocacy helped pass legislation banning Source of Income Discrimination statewide (HB2578), ending the sunset and increasing the funding for homeless services (HB1570), expanding the Housing and Essential Needs program and increasing asset limits for assistance (HB2667 & HB1831), and clarifying the status of tax credits so that non-profits are not taxed when the property transfers ownership at 15 years (HB2444).
